

WORKSHOP ON CROSS-SECTORAL EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP FORUM ON MAINSTREAMING TIGER HABITATS

20-22 February 2012, Kuala Lumpur

Background

The Global Tiger Initiative (GTI), launched in 2008, is made up of an alliance of governments and international organisations. Through this initiative, a Global Tiger Recovery Program (GTRP) was developed by the 13 Tiger Range Countries (TRCs) to address the crisis of tiger extinction and to highlight tigers as the face of biodiversity.

The GTRP's overarching goal is to reverse the rapid decline of wild tigers and their habitat and to strive to double the number of wild tigers across their range by 2022. After a two-year process of sharing knowledge and best practices and developing a common vision, the GTRP works toward:

- effectively managing, preserving, protecting, and enhancing tiger habitats
- eradicating poaching, smuggling, and the illegal trade and demand for tigers, their parts and derivatives
- cooperating in trans-boundary landscape management and in combating illegal trade
- engaging with indigenous and local communities
- increasing the effectiveness of tiger and habitat management
- restoring tigers to their former range

At the unprecedented International Tiger Summit held in St. Petersburg, Russian Federation, in November 2010, governments of the 13 TRCs have endorsed and adopted the GTRP to not only reverse, but double the remaining wild tiger population. The signed declaration specifically mentioned the importance of '*mainstreaming biodiversity conservation in planning and development processes in tiger habitat*' and for '*making core tiger breeding habitats inviolate areas within the larger tiger conservation landscapes where no economic or commercial infrastructure development or other adverse activities are permitted; and maintaining the landscapes and creating corridors around and between them where all permitted development activities are tiger- and biodiversity-compatible*'.

Workshop on Cross-Sectoral Executive Leadership Forum on Mainstreaming Tiger Habitats

The workshop is part of an ongoing process to enhance the implementation of relevant national component of the GTRP that was endorsed by the governments of the TRCs at the Global Tiger Summit in 2010. Among the main objectives of the workshop are to:

- Highlight the importance of integrating the conservation of tiger habitats into national spatial plans;
- Explore means for incorporating Smart Green Infrastructure to link fragmented tiger habitats; and
- Deliberate further sustainable financial mechanisms in conserving tiger and its habitats.

Engagement of these high-level executives as part of the decision-making process in their respective countries will serve to strengthen institutional capacity and increase knowledge sharing across sectors for fuller integration of tiger and other wildlife conservation measures.

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As part of GTI's efforts, a partnership between the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute (SCBI) and The World Bank was created to establish replicable and scalable models of effective collaboration between governmental and non-governmental stakeholders in the Tiger Range Countries (TRC) and between TRCs. The partnership, called the Smithsonian's Tiger Conservation Partnership (TCP), aims to strengthen the capacity of professional management of protected areas in tiger conservation landscapes and knowledge sharing for effective implementation of the GTRP.

The Tiger Conservation Partnership (TCP) has identified the need for a national awareness-raising workshop catering to high-level government and industry executives to focus on cross-sectoral challenges and requirements of the implementation of GTRP. To this, a workshop in Malaysia entitled “Cross-Sectoral Executive Leadership Forum on Mainstreaming Tiger Habitats” has been planned on 19-23 February 2012.

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Engagement of these high-level executives as part of the decision-making process in their respective countries will serve to strengthen institutional capacity and increase knowledge sharing across sectors for fuller integration of tiger and other wildlife conservation measures.

The conference aims to also increase overall efficiency and sustainability of the GTRP.
